19th National Meeting American Association of Clinical Chemists

Marriott Motor Hotel, Philadelphia, Pa.

Aug. 21-25, 1967

The Philadelphia Section wishes to announce that the 19th National Meeting will be held Aug. 21-25, 1967, at the Marriott Motor Hotel, Philadelphia, Pa. All members and affiliates of the Association and others interested in the field of clinical chemistry are cordially invited to participate.

The various committees are already at work to insure a most rewarding meeting for clinical chemists as well as a full program of extracurricular activities for the scientists, their families, and friends.

Program

Tentative arrangements have been made for symposia, with invited speakers, on newer physical methods of analysis, purine metabolism and gout, precision, accuracy, and performance evaluation, red blood cell enzymes, and the aims, organization, and accomplishments of clinical chemists in other countries.

It is planned to present, on Monday evening, Aug. 21, a Panel Discussion on Medicare, with participation by a representative of the Federal government, together with others from the various areas and disciplines involved.

Submitted papers of 15 min. duration, including discussion period, will complement the sessions outlined above.

Members and others wishing to submit papers for consideration for inclusion in the program should submit, by Apr. 15, 1967, triplicates of the title and abstract to the Program Chairman, Dr. J. H. Wilkinson, Pepper Laboratory, Hospital of the University of Pennsylvania, 34th and Spruce St., Philadelphia, Pa. 19104. Abstracts must be typewritten, double-spaced, of 250 words or less, and in the form shown in the August 1966 issue of CLINICAL CHEMISTRY. The name of the author presenting the paper is to be underlined.

Exhibitors will show general and specialized laboratory equipment and instrumentation of interest to clinical chemists. Some consideration is being given to the possibility of having meaningful scientific, educational exhibits.

The City of Philadelphia and its environs offers much of interest to those

vacationing in the East. As birthplace of the nation, Philadelphia, the largest city of Colonial America, has preserved its heritage of being the site of the Continental Congress, the Declaration of Independence, and the home of Independence Hall and the Liberty Bell. Visits to famous art and science museums are planned, and sightseeing tours through the picturesque and historic Delaware Valley will be made available. For those desiring it, an extended vacation in Washington, D. C. and New York City can be planned.
